

28th April - Audley End Essex

Audley End was once one of the largest most opulent houses in Jacobean England. An impressive great hall, with magnificent state apartments, intimate dressing rooms, libraries and an 18th century gothic-style chapel reveal details of an earlier more formal era. When Audley End was built by Thomas Howard, 1st Earl of Suffolk, between 1605 and 1614, it was the size of a palace, suitable for a royal visit. Only the architectural and interior features from



this period survive. In 1762, when Sir John Griffin Griffin inherited the house, he employed the architect **Robert Adam** to create a suite of furnished reception rooms. The service areas to the north of the house are now dressed to show their original use, from the kitchens to larders and laundries. The painting collection contains a large number of early English portraits and a number of Old Masters. Look out for the state bed, one of the most important surviving late 18th-century beds in the country, commissioned in anticipation of a royal visit in 1794.

19th May - Chartwell

It was the much-loved **Churchill** family home from 1922 and from which Sir Winston, until the end of his life, drew inspiration The rooms remain much as they were when he lived here, with books and personal mementoes evoking his career and the wideranging interests of this great statesman, writer, painter and family man.



The hillside gardens reflect Sir Winston's love of the landscape and nature and include the lakes he created, the kitchen garden and the Marycot, a playhouse designed for his youngest daughter Mary.

The Studio was erected in the 1930s, and built as a space for Churchill to paint without interruption and is home to the largest collection of his paintings that have been saved for the nation to see and enjoy. The Studio is teeming with Churchill canvasses, many unframed and in various stages of completion and it became a favourite refuge for Churchill. When he was not outdoors, he was in the studio. There is also Churchill's only attempt at sculpture to be seen, which was executed whilst he himself was being sculpted by Nemon in 1954.
