Thursday 10th May: Sarah Stopford (Harvard & Cambridge) lectured on THE ART OF JOAN MIRÓ THE LADDER OF ESCAPE.

Sarah Stopford showed excellent slides of this highly regarded Spanish painter, Explaining his strange, hallucinatory beings, springing from his sub-conscious dream world – and the anger and passion he expressed about the terrors in the Spanish civil war – his beloved country, torn apart. He followed the art trends of the time and later was recognised as the leading Spanish Surrealist.

#### A FISH SALE ON A CORNISH BEACH

A huge amount of academic research had clearly been done by Alan, as he explained all the influences on Stanhope Forbes RA (1857-1947), particularly as demonstrated in A Fish Sale on a Cornish Beach. Among these, were his time at the Parisian studio of Leon Bonnat and the other artists he met there and elsewhere. Concurrently with the Impressionists, he was painting en plein air, concentrating on character, the play of light and evoking the textures of nature. He painted in Brittany, exhibited at the Royal Academy and then settled in Cornwall with his wife. He became known as the father of the Newlyn School of artists. Here he painted the beautiful Fish Sale, which has a very natural look, but Alan showed how he had gleaned from a preparatory study and Forbes' constant letters, especially to his mother, that he had used models and changed he distribution of figures over many months. These letters were often illustrated by deft and funny cartoons. Muriel

#### **PAST LECTURES**


## **Thursday 9<sup>th</sup> August 8 pm Dr. John Sankey** lectured on *SIR THOMAS BROCK, LONDON'S FORGOTTEN SCULPTOR*

Dr. Sankey, a wonderful character, delivered an unforgettable lecture about a forgotten sculptor. After retiring from a distinguished army career, Dr. Sankey completed a PhD on Sir Thomas Brock, a Victorian (1847-1922), whose work was considered out of date by the time he died. He was very well-known in his day and was commissioned to fashion many sculptures of well-known personalities. His most famous work was the design of the Victoria Memorial in front of Buckingham Palace. At the unveiling, attended by much of Europe's royalty, a few months before Brock's death, King George V made a spontaneous decision to borrow a sword and knight him. The talk was peppered with such stories and caused much amusement. Dr. Sankey was ably assisted by his wife in managing the slides and prompting him, since he is registered blind and losing his hearing. Well done, Juliet. I don't know how you found him, but he is a treasure!

## **FUTURE VISITS**

21<sup>st</sup> October Ashmolean Museum, listed in the Guinness Book of Records as the first museum in the world is home to a number of art collections as well as anthropological and archaeological treasures. 'The Forest Fire' Piero di Cosimo 'Hunt in the Forest' Paolo Uccello', 'High Street,Oxford' J.M.WTurner and 'View from my Window Éragny-sur-Epte' Pissaro are all highlights not to miss.

The **Randolph Hotel** opposite is renowned for its afternoon teas.

### Belvoir Castle on Sunday 20th May.

24 members and guests arrived at midday with the sight of this spectacular Castle which looked stunning, sitting on a hilltop overlooking the surrounding Leicestershire countryside. The yellowish colour of the stonework glowed in the glorious sunshine. After exploring the beautiful gardens-rhododendrons in all their glory and a wonderful Clematis Montana climbing up the walls of the Castle, we met our guide - Gerald, for an exceedingly interesting tour of the rooms open to the public. The Castle has been home to the Dukes of Rutland since 1067!, with the eleventh Duke currently residing there with his family. Highlight of the tour was the Picture Gallery with family portraits alongside a Holbein (Henry VIII), and two magnificent paintings of Dogs by Stubbs. In most rooms we were able to sit on the furniture, almost "at home" with the family! Some of the bedrooms had magnificent Chinese wallpaper adorning the walls in all their glory. Altogether a very pleasant day in Leicestershire countryside resplendent in the summer sunshine.

## Petworth House and Park, South Downs on Sunday 24th June

We saw the excellent collection of paintings acquired by the Percy Family and a special display on their involvement in the Gunpowder Plot. Part of the National Trust 'Women and Power' programme was an exhibition on Elizabeth Ilive, the mistress and then wife of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Earl of Egremont. Included was a reimagining of her laboratory where she conducted many experiments, and the silver medal she received from the Royal society of Arts for her invention of a "cross bar lever".

An interesting and enjoyable visit.
