### 23-April-17 UPPARK HOUSE

Uppark house, set high on the South Downs, was built for Ford Grey (1655-1701), the first Earl of Tankerville, c.1690 and sold to Sir Matthew Fetherstonhaugh and his wife Sarah in 1747. Matthew and Sarah redecorated the house extensively from 1750 to 1760 and introduced most of the existing collection of household items displayed today, much of it collected on their Grand Tour of 1749 to 1751. The house was largely destroyed by fire in 1989 but fortunately a large amount of the contents were saved and it was subsequently restored in the 1990's. The Georgian interiors illustrate the comfort of life 'upstairs', in contrast with the grim 'downstairs' world of the servants. The interior houses paintings, ceramics, textiles and furniture. A highlight of the collection is one of the best examples of a 17th century doll's house in the country. The servant's quarters, accessible by winding underground tunnels, give real insight into the engine room of a thriving household. Perched on a vantage point high on the South Downs ridge, it commands views as far south as the English Channel. Outside, the intimate gardens are being gradually restored to their original 18th-century design. The original planned additional visit to Hinton Ampner as shown in our calendar has had to be cancelled for technical reasons.

### 21-May-17 OXBURGH HALL

Following our failure to get here in 2016 due to a problem with the building we will try again to visit Oxburgh Hall. It is a moated country house, built around 1482 by Sir Edmund Bedingfeld. It has always been a family home, not a fortress, and they have lived here ever since. It is a fine example of a late medieval, inward-facing great house. Inside see the astonishing needlework by Mary, Queen of Scots and the priest hole. There are a number of rooms open, including the library, saloon and armoury, with many items of furniture, ceramics and a large number of pictures including various Kings and members of the family. There is also a chapel with stained glass windows (some dating from the 14th century). Outside there is a parterre, herbaceous borders and a walled kitchen garden as well as grounds to explore. There is a restaurant and shop on the site.

# **FUTURE VISITS**

### We are planning a three day trip to Cardiff in September.

Tour Cost: £265 per person sharing twin/double room.

Single Supplement £50 Accommodation: Angel Hotel, Cardiff Included in the trip will be visits to:

- - The National Museum of Cardiff, where we will view one of Europe's finest collections of art, including five hundred years of magnificent paintings, drawings, sculpture, silver and ceramics from Wales and across the world.
  - Castell Coch. a 19th-century Gothic Revival castle built on the remains of a • genuine 13th-century fortification with dazzling ceilings, over-the-top furnishings and furniture. Its drawing room has 58 panels, each depicting a unique plant, surmounted by a mural showing animals from Aesop's Fables. Carved birds, lizards and other wildlife decorate the doorways.
  - Cardiff Castle with its spectacular fairy-tale apartments, rich with murals, gilding and elaborate wood carvings, stained glass and marble, created by artarchitect William Burges for the 3rd Marguess of Bute. Also included will be a guided House Tour which takes you through some of the most amazingly opulent, highly decorated rooms. The rooms you will visit with your expert guide include the Winter Smoking Room, The Nursery, Lord Bute's Bedroom and The Roof Top Garden.
  - Chepstow Museum which displays the rich and varied past of this ancient town, once an important port and market centre. There are displays of Chepstow's wine trade, shipbuilding and salmon fishing as well as photographs, programmes and posters recalling the pastimes of local people. The 18th and 19th century paintings and prints illustrate the everlasting appeal of Chepstow and the Wye Valley to artists and tourists alike.
  - Our return journey will stop in Cheltenham where we will visit the Wilson Art Gallerv and Museum which houses an internationally significant collection of exceptional quality and variety, including changing displays of their Arts and Crafts Movement collection, fine art collections, and The Paper Store, which houses fascinating archives relating to Antarctic explorer Edward A. Wilson. If you have any time (and energy!) left you can also take a short walk and visit the Holst Birthplace Museum (admission not included in tour cost). The house which was built in 1832 is typical of the many smaller Regency terraced houses built in Cheltenham at that time. It contains details of the famous composer's life and music with reminiscences of domestic life at the end of the 19th Century.
