PAST LECTURES

Thursday 6th February: Frank Woodgate lectured on THE ART OF AI WEIWEI: EVERYTHING IS ART, EVERYTHING IS POLITICS

Why are totalitarian governments so often obsessed with the potential power of their citizen artists? Ai Weiwei and his father, a Chinese poet, were each exiled and imprisoned by succeeding governments. These experiences have affected all of Ai Weiwei's life and work. Frank showed how Ai Weiwei was also heavily influenced by other artists, such as Warhol, Duchamp, Jasper Johns and the Dadaists, while he was a young man in New York. We saw images of various works depicting his propensity to protest, mostly about the activities of the Chinese government. Among these were: Dropping a Han Dynasty Urn (against the destruction of Chinese history); Sunflower Seeds (representing the downtrodden Chinese population); Surveillance Camera (protesting against his house arrest). Frank was very enthusiastic about Ai Weiwei's versatility and skill as an architect, painter, installation artist, political activist and blogger.

Tuesday 10thMarch: Anita Greene lectured on "THE STUNNERS" PRE RAPHAELITES, THEIR WOMEN AND THEIR ART

Anita gave us a fascinating talk about five women who could be said to have made the artistic reputations of the Pre-Raphaelite group of artists. They were Annie Miller (1835-1925); Effie Gray (1828-1897); Fanny Cornforth (1835-1909); Jane Morris (1839-1914) and Lizzie Siddall. They acted as models plus wives, lovers, muses and fellow artists to members of the Brotherhood. They are all recognizable in idealized form. We were shown Holman Hunt's *The Awakening Conscience*, Dante Gabriel Rosetti's *Dante's Dream* — both featuring Annie Miller; Effie Gray in Millais' *The Order of Release*; Fanny Cornforth in Rosetti's *Bocca Baciata*; Jane Morris as *Proserpina* by Rosetti and in William Morris's *The Day Dream* and Lizzie Siddall in both Millais' *Ophelia* and Rosetti's *Beata Beatrix*. Anita gave us interesting biographies and amusing anecdotes about these women, often showing how they were used and abused by the male artists. **Muriel Beaver**

VISITS

Due to the rapid spread of the **COVID19 VIRUS** and the consequent nationwide lockdown on the **20**th **March**, it was unfortunate that our first visit of 2020 to the **SAATCHI GALLERY & TUTANKHAMUN EXHIBITION** on the **22**nd **March** had to be cancelled. With the lockdown still currently in place, visits cannot go ahead until there is clear guidance from the government on updated safety procedures to observe with, not only coach travel but also group visits to museums, galleries and stately homes. Our visits to **Compton Verney** in April and **Leicester Cathedral and Art Gallery** in May have also cancelled and I am also sorry to say that I have had to cancel our trips to **Wilton House** in June (too close to be able to certain we can run it) and to **Althorp** and **Highclere.** Though both of those were a bit further out in July and August both of them required us to commit to the number of people going by early June which under the current situation we can't do.

On a slightly more positive note if things do improve and we think we can run viable trips safely and following government advice. I may be able to replace the July and August trips with Compton Verney and Leicester Cathedral and Art Gallery as both of those do not need us to commit upfront but we would still need enough people to make the cost viable. If it looks like we might be able to run those trips I will ask our membership their views about potentially going on the trip. At the moment our holiday in September is still potentially able to be run but again that will depend on government advice and the availability of our venues and hotel closer to the time. Again I will keep people informed about the status.

Your committee is well aware of members' anxieties and will ensure that future trips, when they can be arranged, will have the health and safety of our members as a priority. Please bear with us in these difficult times, we have not forgotten you. Gary Harding
